		☐ Recognise the differences within and amongst families.	-How did Elmer feel when he was grey and standing with the elephants? Was he having fun? What did he do? Explain what the other elephants meant when they said 'What would we do without you?' and explain that this means he is special to the elephants because he is different. Activity- In small groups look at the illustrations in the books at all the different animals. What makes them different? What makes them the same? Explain that they are happy to live amongst each other even though they are all different.	Differences
4	Friends and Family	 Understand that having differences between us is a good thing. Notice and talk about differences in nature. Recognise the differences within and amongst families. 	Go on an autumn walk and look for leaves. Encourage each child to collect a leaf to bring back to Nursery. Children talk about their leaves and why they like them. Look at how all of the leaves are different to each other and they do not look the same. Explain that even though the leaves are from the same tree, they look different. -How are we different to one another? -Do we look the same as our friends? 5	Including Everyone	 Explore and use different materials. Show kindness by including their friends. Talk about how to help those who are in need. By making themselves colourful and patterned they were including Elmer. -How does Elmer feel when they have the party? -How do the other elephants feel when they give the party for Elmer? -When we are kind to each other, how does that make us feel? Activity- In small groups set up a role-play party with soft toys. Talk about writing invitations and provide children with tools to write invites. 6	Including Everyone	1	Using a puppet explain that he has been left out by the other toys because they are too noisy/bright/small/big (whatever suits appearance of toy/puppet.)
